# Winter Rifle Frolic Fast Approaching

The annual Endless Mountains Winter Rifle Frolic is right around the corner. The event will be held Saturday, February 12, 2022 at the American Legion Post 510 in Laceyville, PA. Online registration and waivers may be completed at <a href="https://www.empo.us">www.empo.us</a> Registration will be held at 9am and competitions will begin at 10am and conclude at 2pm. An awards ceremony will be held immediately following the close of the events. The Winter Rifle Frolic provides a day of primitive activity with lots of shooting, tomahawk throwing, mountain man novelty target shoot, and a long distance shot. Flintlock or percussion weapons with round balls only (no inlines). Primitive attire is not

required but encouraged. All competitions have an entry fee, and may be entered as many times as the participant wishes. The event is free to spectators. Silent Auction and 50/50 Raffle will be held. Food will be available for purchase from the Legion in the afternoon.

Monthly meetings are held the first Monday of each month at the American Legion Post 510 at 6pm, when possible.

Virtual meetings are held via Zoom when necessary. Check out www.empo.us for details prior to each meeting.

# How It All Started

What began as a fundraiser for the Oldest House in Laceyville, PA transitioned into a new non-profit organization which hosts three annual events that are attended by hundreds each year. In 2008, Robin Robinson hosted his first small scale show featuring his personal collection as an opportunity to raise funds for the Oldest House. Each year his show continued to grow as others joined him for a glimpse at the past. Eventually the show expanded to the yard of the Oldest House and even welcomed a couple primitive campers (see photo below).

In 2012, the event outgrew the venue and the decision was made to seek another location for 2013. That is when Robin decided to move the event to the American Legion Post 510. After the 2013 Rendezvous other individuals with similar passions began to meet and discuss forming a club to continue growth in a more formal capacity. The Primitive Endless Mountains Outdoorsmen was formed in 2015 guided by the mission to educate, recreate, and preserve the customs conditions of traditional weapons, crafts and artisans of early America.


Robin said, "I was inspired by my good friend, Donny Arrowood and the organization that he belongs to (Lancaster County Longrifles)." Robin also noted that he enjoys how we offer a bit of everything for every -one. He recognized that there was interest for an organization like ours, but he did not realize that the interest in our area would be so great. The Endless Mountains Primitive Outdoorsmen is now in the process of planning our 14th Rendezvous Muzzleloader Shoot Artisan Show. The club has grown from an idea to an organization with just over 200 members.


When looking through his scrapbook of photos and newspaper articles he reflected on past events. Robin noted, "It is hard to believe how far we have come in such a short time." Robin hopes to see the organization continue to grow.

Robin was the first president of EMPO and served as such for a number of years until personal reasons required that he step down. He currently serves on the board of directors and works closely to coordinate each of the events that the club hosts.

Robin also wished to express his gratitude to the American Legion for their unwavering support of EMPO as well as all of the members that belong to the club, "whether you are an active or inactive member, a

board member or a general member you are part of the community that helps to grow our organization."





#### **Featured Artisan**

#### **Alan Superko**

In 2010, Alan harvested some saplings that he thought would make some nice walking sticks, which sparked his search for a hobby that he could work on over the winter.

As he worked on the walking sticks, which were plain at the time, Alan thought that it would be interesting to try carving some and that maybe he could sell a few. He made a phone call to his uncle, Bob Superko, who had built hundreds of muzzleloaders, pipe tomahawks, and accoutrements since the 1970s. Alan reached out for some pointers on carving and Bob agreed and said that he would love to visit and share some projects that he had completed.

When Alan visited, Bob showed him a few pipe tomahawks that he completed for a show. Al was in awe after admiring them and taking some photos. He inquired about methods and techniques used to create such nice pieces. Bob provided lots of pointers and suggested that Al give it a try and to reach out if he had any questions. That prompted Alan to purchase a kit and give it a try. After assembling the kit, and some engraving and inlay work, he returned to Bob's for some critiquing. After reviewing his work, Bob claimed that Al had a lot of potential. That set his new hobby into motion.

Al ended up purchasing more materials and building a half dozen pipe tomahawks of different styles and designs. In 2012, a coworker put him in touch with Robin Robinson about an event where he might be able to sell his goods. Once Robin saw Al's work, the invitation was open to attend his event at the Oldest House in Laceyville.

After selling a few tomahawks, and receiving high praise for his work, Alan (and his son) were hooked!

Since then he has built a large number of pipe tomahawks and all things muzzleloader. His pieces have homes locally, in other states, and in several other countries.



## **Partnering with Historic Sites**

Each year since its inception, EMPO has made a contribution to area historical institutions from its net earnings at its events' entry donations. "Area history museums and historic homes and sites are partners with EMPO in keeping the history of this region alive," notes EMPO President Al Superko. "It's only right that we contribute a little bit, when we can, to help them out."

Some of the area sites which have received donations in the past include The Oldest House, built in the 1780s and located in Laceyville; French Azilum near Wysox; the Wyalusing Museum in Wyalusing; and the Wyoming County Historical Society, headquartered in Tunkhannock.

The Oldest House is the oldest stick built home in the counties of Wyoming, Sullivan, Susquehanna and Bradford. Open Friday-Sunday each summer, the House showcases various exhibits about life and work throughout its 250+ year history, including a period clothing exhibit on the top floor. Used as a family home from the 1780s through the 1960s, the House has also served as a stop on the Susquehanna River and a church/meeting house; it housed members of the Lacey family, for whom Laceyville is named, for almost 100 years. French Azilum is the site of a purpose-built colony which existed from 1793–1803 and housed noble and aristocratic refugees from the French Revolution. It had originally been hoped that Marie Antoinette herself might escape the guillotine and settle along the banks of the Susquehanna. A short informative film in the museum cabin as well as a self-guided tour of the site and its outbuildings, including a working Blacksmith Shop and historic barn with timbers from the 1700s, culminates in a guided tour of the LaPorte House, built by the son of one of Azilum's original settlers. Open all summer on Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays from 11–4 pm, Azilum also hosts special events like Family Fun Day, Vino & Van Gogh, Themed Teas, and a Civil War Weekend. The Wyalusing Museum contains a wealth of artefacts, manuscripts and photographs of the history of Wyalusing and its immediate surrounding area. Located along the Susquehanna River, which was the 'highway' before road, canal and then train travel became possible in the late 19th century, Wyalusing was a major business and economic center on the main route from Towanda to Tunkhannock and points in 'the Valley' and what would become Wilkes-Barre. Some of the area's most comprehensive collections of Original Peoples' stone tools are housed at the Museum, which is open June through October, Saturday and Sunday, 12–4 pm. The Wyoming County Historical Society is both a repository and a resource for nearly all types of history of the area. With extensive microfiche records of newspapers and other materials dating back to the 18th century, as well as a genealogical library and general information, the Society is the place to start for research into Wyoming County's past. The second event will be the *Endless Mountains Black Powder Scholarship Shoot*. The event takes place the first Sunday in June. This year's event is Sunday, June 5th. Registration will open in advance on our website or in person at 9am the day of the event. Competitions will begin at 10am and conclude at 2pm. An awards ceremony will follow the conclusion of the competitions.

The proceeds from the scholarship shoot are used, in combination with donations, to offer our annual scholarship of \$1,000.

The third event 2022 will be the *Endless Mountains* Rendezvous Muzzleloader Shoot and Artisan Show. The event takes place the weekend after Labor Day. This year's event is September 10th and 11th. # **Awarded Grants**

EMPO is pleased to report that it has been awarded a Publicity & Advertising Grant from the Wyoming County Room Tax and the Endless Mountains Visitors' Bureau. This is the third consecutive year that EMPO has been granted funding for advertising the club and its activities.

The grant is geared towards Wyoming County based organizations which draw people to the county from more than 50 miles away; EMPO definitely belongs in that category, as our Winter Frolic, Spring Shoot and most certainly our Muzzleloader Rendezvous welcome visitors from New England as well as the near Midwest and the Del-Mar-Va area.

EMPO has been recognized several times by visitors and participants in our events as one of the friendliest and best-run organizations of its kind in the region, educating and demonstrating living history from the era of the Pennsylvania Frontier (1740–1840). \$4500 was requested for 2022, and should be received by mid February.

The money will be spent on national, regional and local print ads in magazines and newspapers, as well as on brochures and flyers informing the public about EMPO and its annual events. Two years ago, large, reusable banners for EMPO and its events were also purchased with money from this grant. EMPO uses promotional tools such as brochures to liaise with area hostelries and restaurants. This provides a structured, informative and engaging resource to visitors which cross-promotes EMPO and its events alongside these hotels, B&Bs and eateries.
